SEED FAIR & DISCUSSION

On June 11th -12th COSPE in partnership with the Ministry of Agriculture, Swaziland Rural Women Assembly, Chakaza Mfati, PELUM Swaziland and Swaziland National Agricultural Union held a Seed Fair and a Seed Discussion.

COSPE and partners are currently running a demonstration plot where seed varieties are produced by farmers in their agro zones. Farmers are demonstrating the use of more resilient production practices using local adaptable varieties in order to improve their livelihoods and respond to climate change.

On the 11th there was a seed fair where farmers involved in the demonstration plots showcased local adaptable seed varieties in Tikhuba,Lubombo. The seed discussion was well attended took place on the 12th. It drew on the experiences from the partners and stakeholders to present workable solutions, improve on tried and tested technologies while opening room for new interventions.

GUBA WINS LUSH PRIZE

People all over the world are developing ways to live in harmony with nature and each other. They are generating renewable resources, restoring ecosystems, nurturing solidarity and building health, wholeness and resilience.



Lush Cosmetics created the Lush Spring Prize to support the regeneration movement. This year's Lush Spring Prize was awarded to 11 organisations from around the world including Eswatini's Guba. PROTECT YOUR GARDEN

Herbal Spray for General Pests and Fungal Problems

- 1 onion
- 5 chilli
- 1 garlic bulb

Steep overnight in five litres of water. Dilute one part of the solution to Five parts of water. Spray three times a week for a heavy infestation.

Oil Spray Insecticide

- 1 cup of vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon of soap

Mix oil and soap. Cover and shake thoroughly. Apply directly surfaces of the plants which are being affected by the little pests. The oil coats the bodies of the insects, effectively suffocating them, as it blocks the pores through which they breathe. This mixture can have a devastating effect on certain troublesome insects, such as aphids, mites, thrips, etc.

SAHEE VISITS ESWATINI

SEED SAVERS EXCHANGE

PELUM Swaziland and member organisation ACAT LIlima Swaziland attended the two-day Seed Saver Exchange meeting organised by Biowatch in South Africa. The two-day event began with a knowledge sharing and exchange session and concluded with a seed blessing ritual

to celebrate farmer-managed seed systems and traditional seed varieties in Ingwavuma, KZN. The learning and exchange visit was attended by the ACAT Project Coordinator, ACAT farmers, community facilitators, the PELUM Country Coordinator, Biowatch staff as well as farmers from the Ngwavuma and Mtubatuba communities. The purpose of this visit was to enable the farmers to share experiences relating to traditional seed preservation and to witness the cultural significance of traditional seed systems in local communities.

Moving Forward

PELUM will encourage our farmers to grow a third plot/field which will be used strictly for seed production. PELUM will also encourage the use of planting holes because this will increase water retention and fertility.

Lastly, we noted that encouraging lead farmers is very important to keep them engaged and motivated to share skills and information with their peers. PELUM will continue to promote and raise awareness on the importance of increasing the amount of our local indigenous seed as well as why it's important to practice natural methods of pest management especially in storing seed.

An idea worth exploring for farmers who are interested in increasing their farmland is for them to ask their neighbours to borrow or lend them fields or land that is currently not being used. This can ensure that food and seed production is increased in communities.
